The Language of Narration

Setting: Targets the five senses to create a vivid picture of where/when.

A cold wind rattled the broken windows of the old house.

Dialogue: Reveals relationships without narrator exposition.

“I told you not to go there,” she whispered.

Characterisation: Reveals personality and realistic flaws.

Narrative Tools

Conflict (Internal vs. External),
Suspense (Creates tension),
Flashback (Provides past context).

The Language of Information

Ireland produced approximately **40%** of its electricity from renewable sources in **2023**.

Factual: High reliance on hard statistics and precise data.

Objective & Direct:
Complete absence of personal opinion.
Clear, logical sentence structure.

Habitat (Where it lives):
Reports, Articles,
Instructions,
Textbooks.

Core Purpose: To give clear facts quickly and efficiently.

The Language of Persuasion

Is it fair that some children go to bed hungry every night? Your donation today could save a life. We demand freedom, justice, and equality to end this heart-breaking suffering.

*Rhetorical Question:
Requires no answer,
forces thought.*

*Guilt / Emotional Appeal:
Makes the reader feel
directly responsible.*

*Triadic Structure:
The Rule of Three for
powerful emphasis.*

*Emotive Language:
Strong words to instantly
influence readers.*

The Language of Argument

Studies show that plastic waste **has increased by 50% since 2020**. If pollution is increasing every year, **shouldn't governments act now?**

Facts and Statistics:
Hard evidence supporting the argument.

Rhetorical Question:
Encourages logical thought, not just emotion.

Logical Reasoning: A clear, structured line of thought moving from evidence to action.

Countries with strict environmental laws have lower pollution levels.

Contrast: Comparing two ideas to highlight the stronger, bulletproof conclusion.

The Aesthetic Use of Language

The golden sun melted slowly into the silent sea as the leaves danced gently in the autumn breeze.

Metaphor: Creating vivid imagery using figurative language.

Descriptive Words: Heavy reliance on atmosphere-building adjectives and adverbs.

Personification: Giving human traits to elements of nature.

Deeper Purpose

This register deeply explores Character Motivation (why they act) and Character Values to create profound emotional depth.

A Snapshot of the Language Registers

Register	Purpose	Features	Examples
Narration	Tell a story	Setting, dialogue, conflict, suspense	Novels, short stories
Information	Inform the reader	Stats, clear structure, objective tone	Reports, textbooks
Persuasion	Convince via emotion	Emotive language, rhetorical questions, rule of three	Speeches, ads
Argument	Convince via logic	Facts, logical reasoning, contrast	Debates, opinion articles
Aesthetic	Create imagery/mood	Metaphor, personification, descriptive words	Poetry, literature

The Architecture of an Exam Answer

*Examiners reward
load-bearing structure.
Identify, name, prove,
and explain.*



[P] Point

State the specific language register and technique.

[E] Evidence

Provide a precise, quoted example directly from the text.

[E] Explanation

Deconstruct exactly how the specific technique functions.

[L] Link

Anchor the paragraph by explaining the exact effect on the reader.

X-Ray of a Full-Marks Response

Prompt: Explain how the writer uses the language of persuasion effectively.

¶

The writer uses the language of persuasion very effectively... ← **[P]** Point
One technique used is **rhetorical questions.** ¶

For example, the writer asks, "Do we really want to leave
this planet in **ruins** for the next generation?" ¶ ← **[E]** Evidence

*Emotive
Language* →

This question **encourages** the reader to **reflect on the
consequences of environmental damage.** ¶ ← **[E]** Explanation

*Loops back
to Persuasion
goal.* →

It forces the reader to **think** about **their responsibility for
protecting the planet.** ¶ ← **[L]** Link
