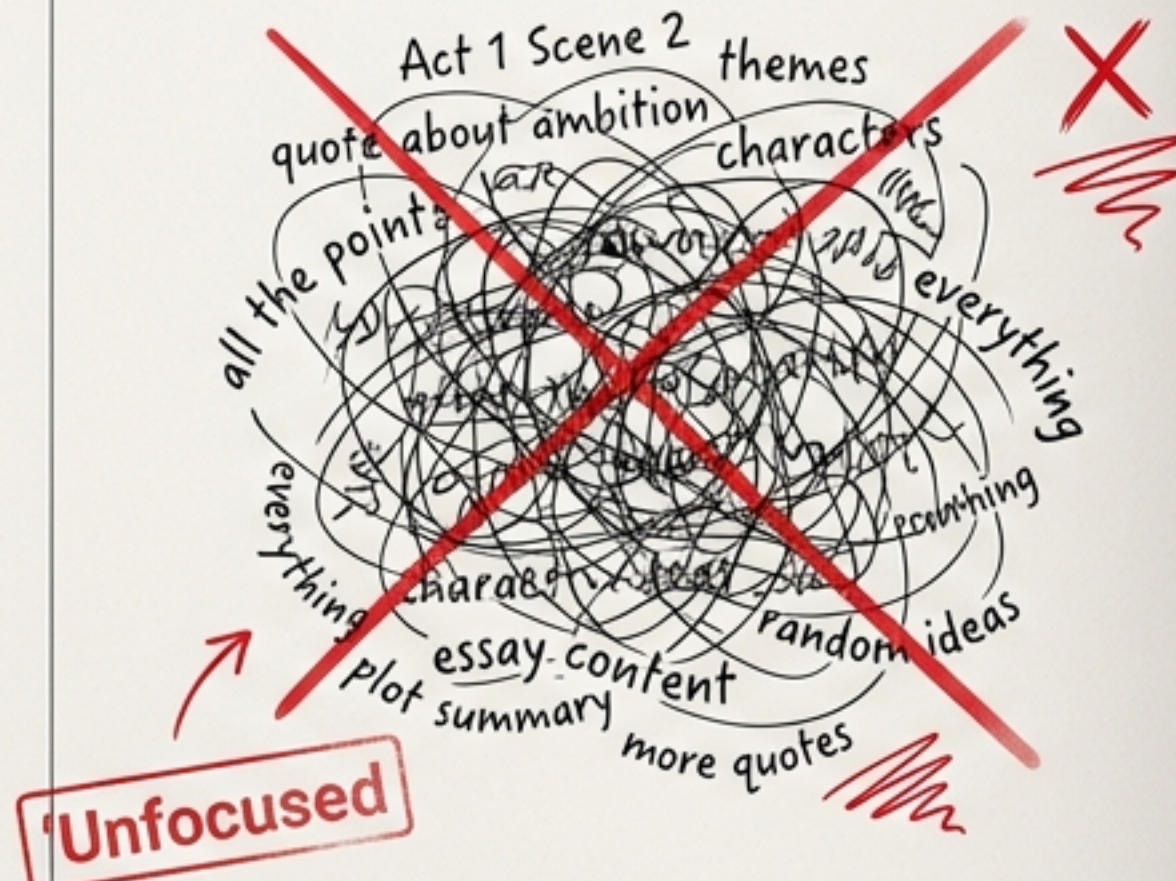

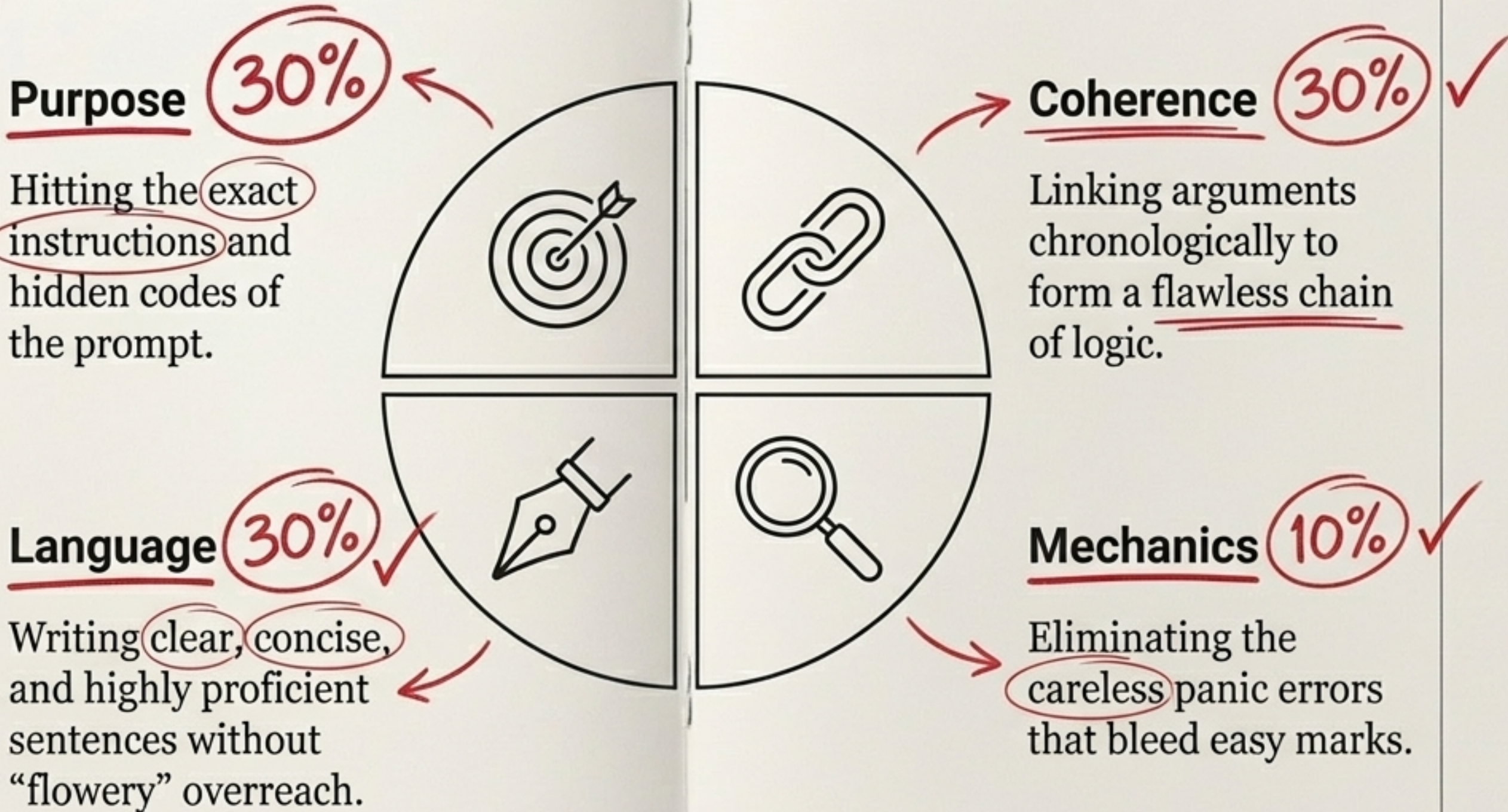

Purpose (30%): Decoding the Hidden Codes

Macbeth's **unstable** and **tragic** identity is shaped by a variety of ambiguities and complexities in his character. Discuss...

Key Insight: Every question contains specific instructions.
If you miss a part of the code, your Purpose mark is permanently capped.

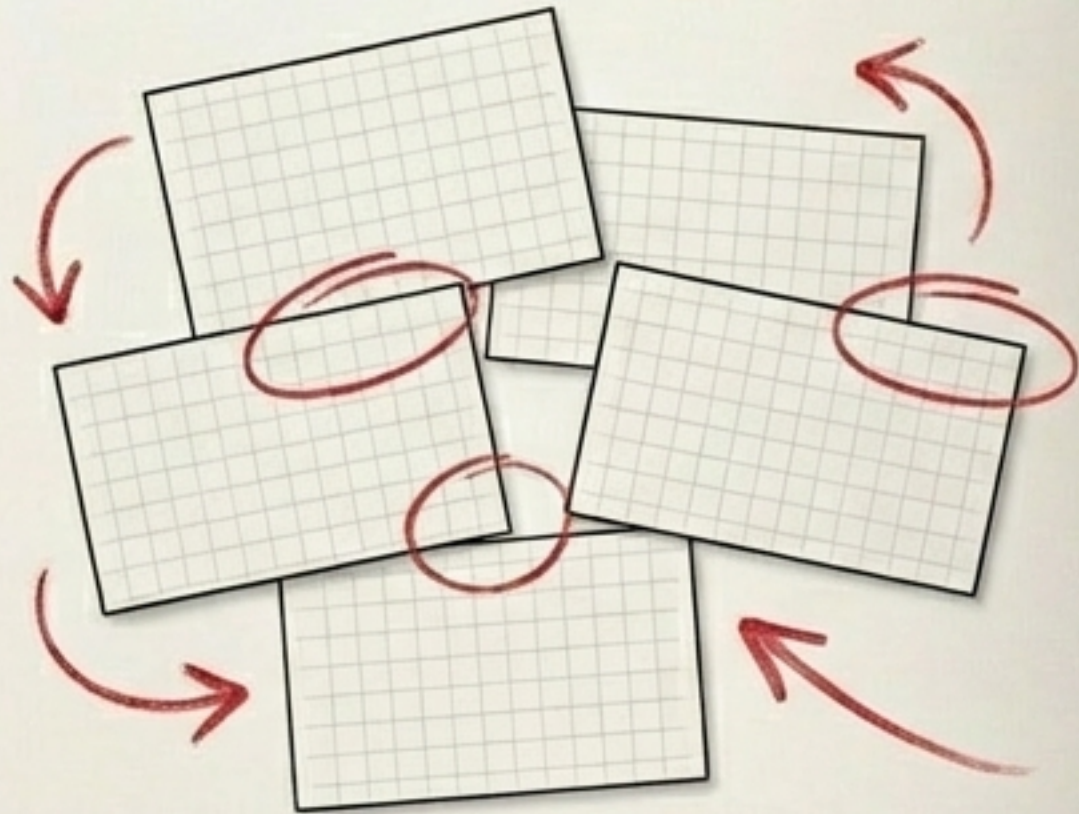

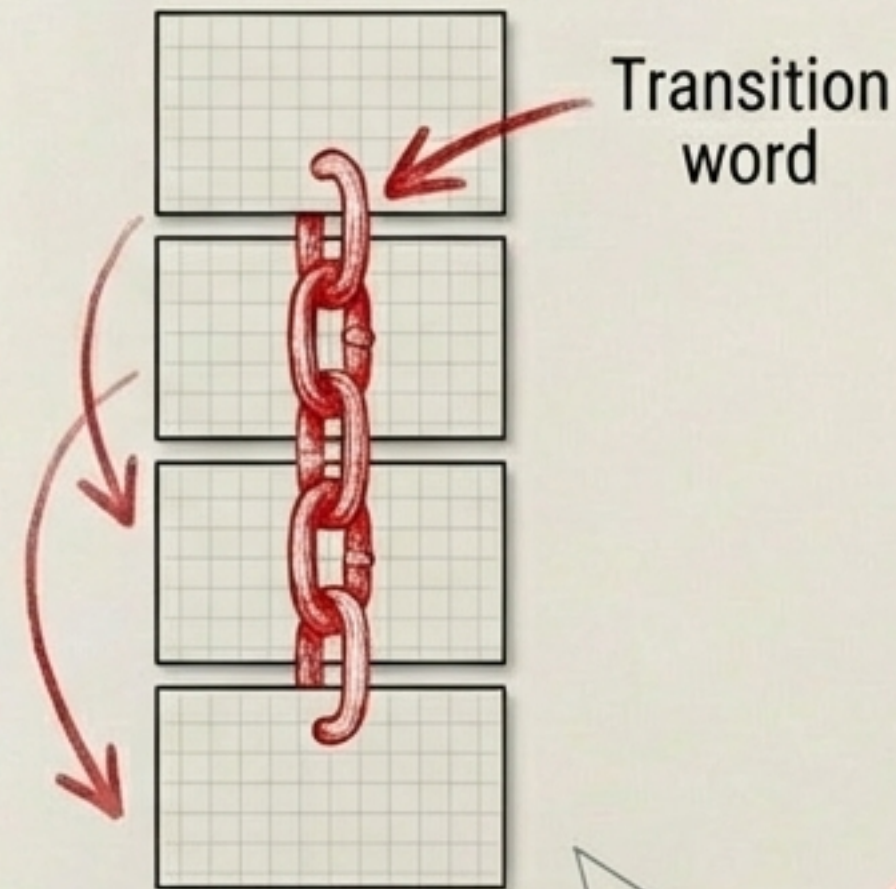
Coherence (30%): The Separation Test

The Deck of Cards



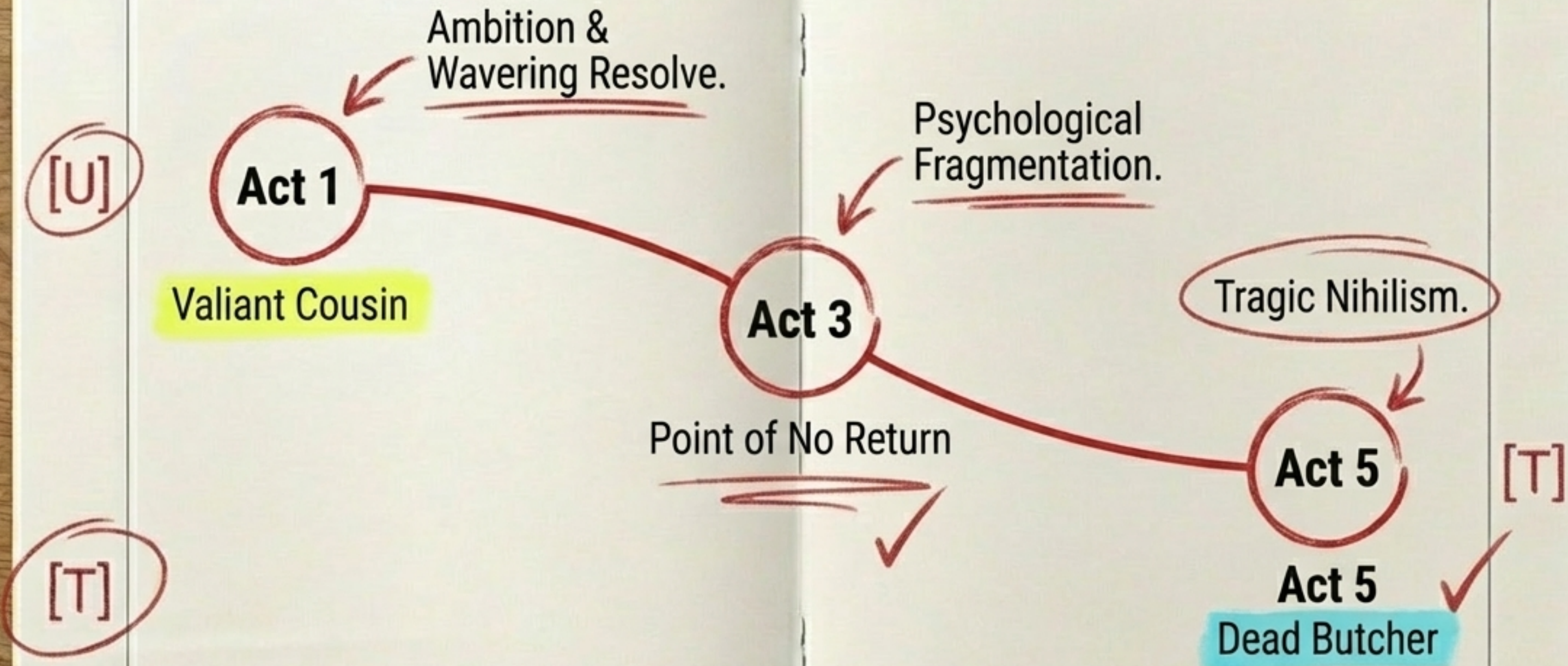
The Examiner's Test: If I shuffle your paragraphs like a deck of cards and hand them to another examiner, can they reassemble them in the correct order using only your transition sentences?

The Chain of Logic



Transitional Logic: Do not jump randomly from Act 1, to Act 5, to Act 3.
Example Link: "While his instability [U] is born of ambition in Act 1, it evolves into a tragic [T] nihilism by Act 5."

The Arc of Human Behavior



Move through the play chronologically. This structure proves to the examiner that you understand the definitive arc of human behaviour and psychological decay.

Synthesis Comparison Matrix: Plot Summary vs. Analytical Insight

Examiner Note: We already know the plot.
We want your analysis.

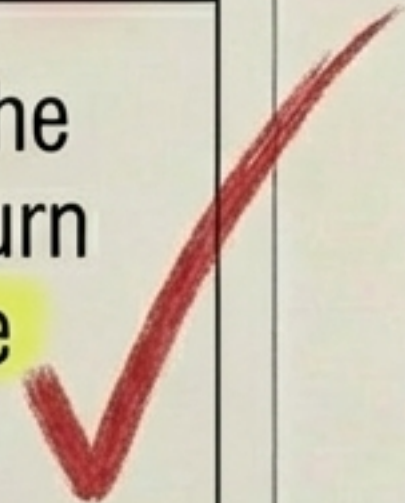

Language (30%): Precision in the Digital Age

Zero Tolerance.

In the digital marking age, examiners use search functions to verify text. Quotes must be 100% perfect. Misquoting suggests a lack of rigour.

Anchor, Don't Decorate.

Use quotes to anchor your insights into human behaviour, not just to decorate the page.

Clarity over Complexity.

Clear and concise sentence structure outscores 'flowery' language every time. Trying too hard makes your points difficult to understand.

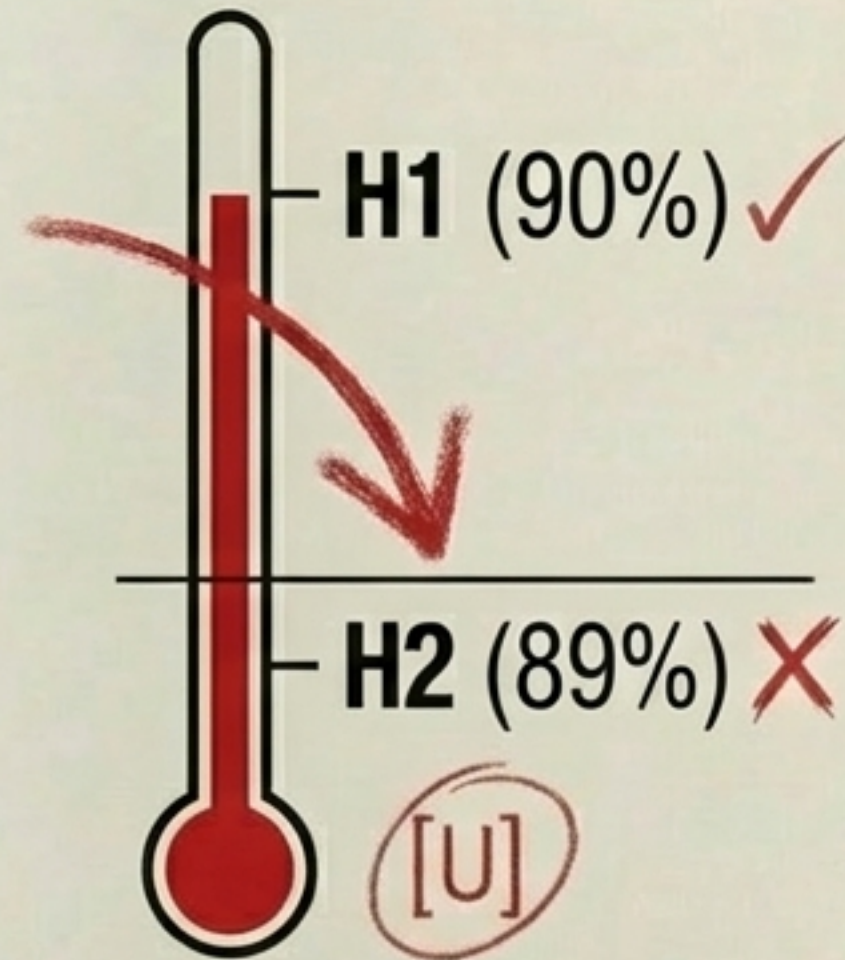
Mechanics (10%): Don't Bleed Easy Marks

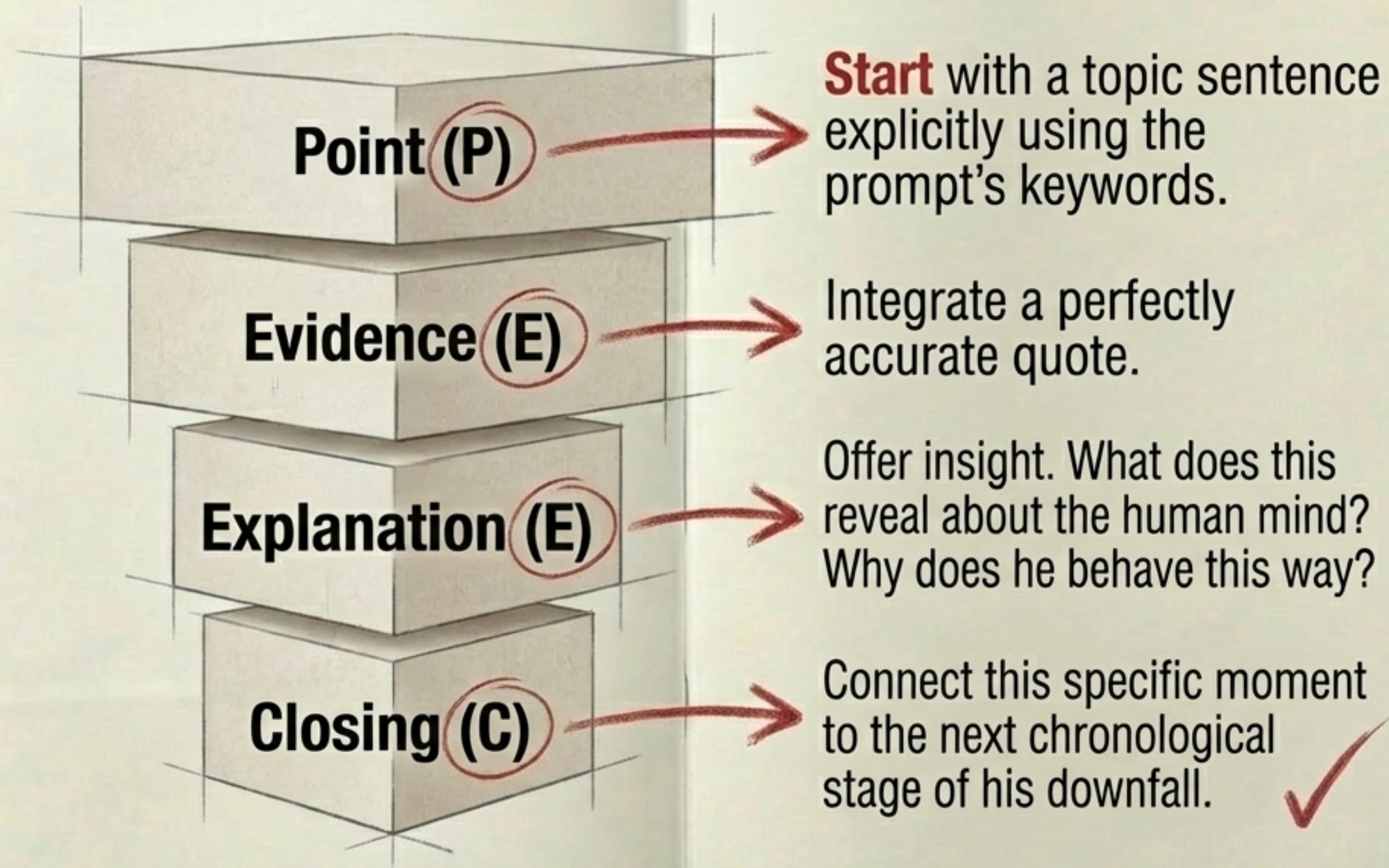

The margins at the top are incredibly tight. You cannot break into the H1 or H2 categories if you make careless spelling or grammatical errors born of panic. To secure a H1, you must aim for full marks in mechanics, losing no more than one single mark across the entire essay.

The H1 Paragraph Architecture: PEEC



The Formula Applied: PEEC in Action

(Point) By Act 3, Macbeth's unstable identity fractures entirely under the weight of his paranoia.

[U]

(Evidence) He laments that his mind is "full of scorpions," perfectly encapsulating his internal torment.

(Explanation) This reveals a human mind incapable of processing the magnitude of its own treason; his psychological baseline is destroyed.

(Closing) Consequently, this paranoia acts as the catalyst that drives his tragic descent into the tyrannical slaughter of Macduff's family.

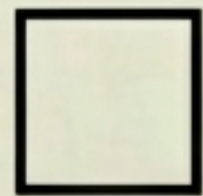
The Final Submission Checklist



The Margins: Are your U and T prompt codes healthily balanced throughout the entire essay?



The Order: If you moved your Act 3 paragraph to the end, would it ruin the chronological, logical flow? (It must!)



The Accuracy: Are your quotes 100% verified? (e.g., 'a walking shadow' vs 'but a walking shadow').



The Insight: Did you explain why humans behave this way when faced with the 'bizarre and unbelievable' (2019 Paper), rather than just summarizing what Macbeth did?
