Exam Question 1: Why would being crippled be worse for Johnny than someone else?

- ✓ - No Physical Escape: Johnny's only defense against his abusive parents and rival gangs was his ability to run and hide.
- ✓ - Loss of Sanctuary: The streets and the vacant lot were his true home; a wheelchair traps him in the one place he feels least safe (his house).
- ✓ - Gang Dependency: Greaser life requires physical toughness. Being paralyzed strips away his role and agency within his chosen family.

The Curtis Brothers Hanging by a Thread

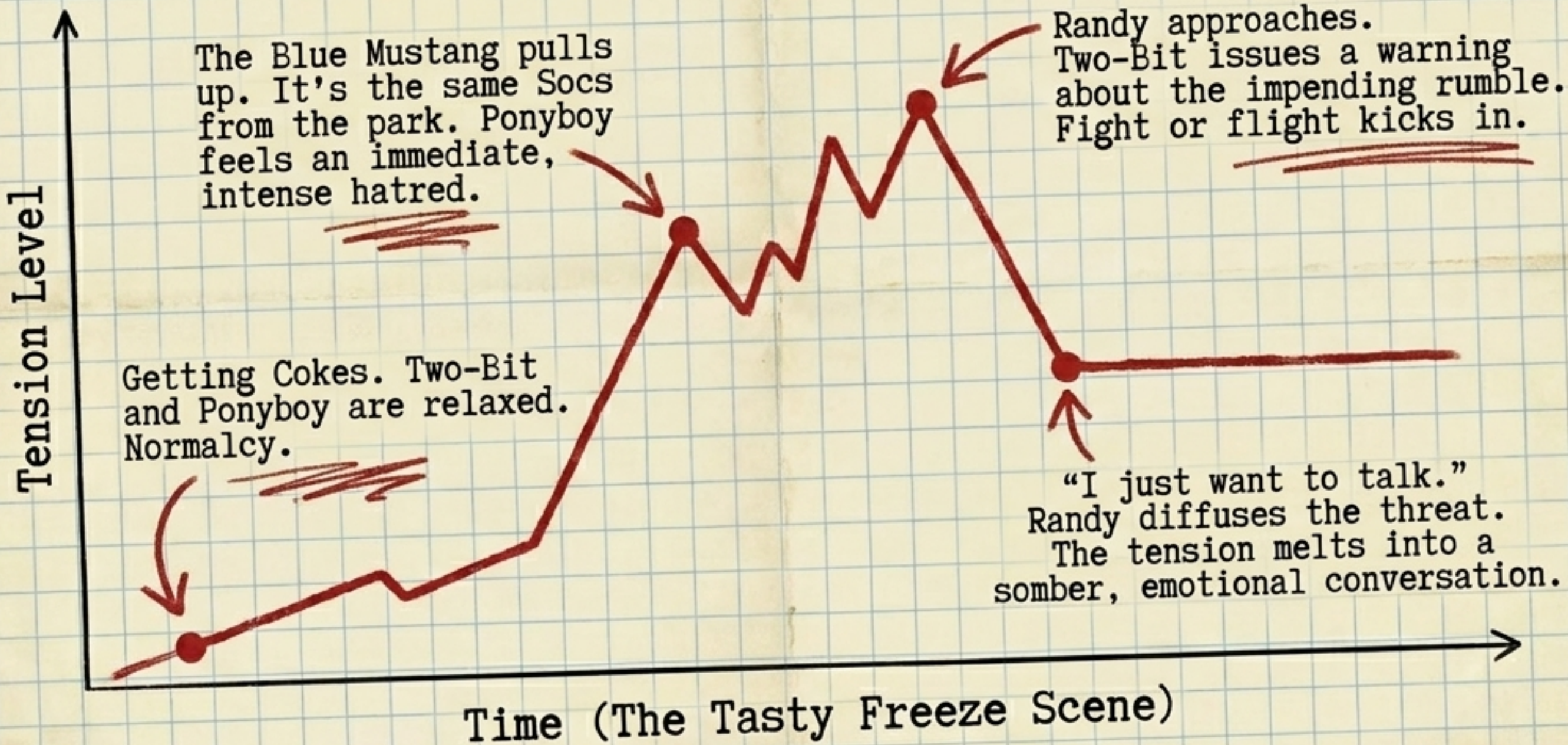
Darry: The Weight of the World. Terrified of the juvenile court separating his family. His strictness masks deep fear.

Sodapop: Hidden Heartbreak. Uses jokes with the reporters to keep the mood light. Secret pain: Sandy got pregnant, her parents refused a marriage due to his age, and she moved to Florida to live with her grandmother.



Ponyboy: Unprocessed Trauma. Suffers a recurring nightmare that began the night of his parents' funeral. He never remembers the dream, but wakes up in intense panic.?

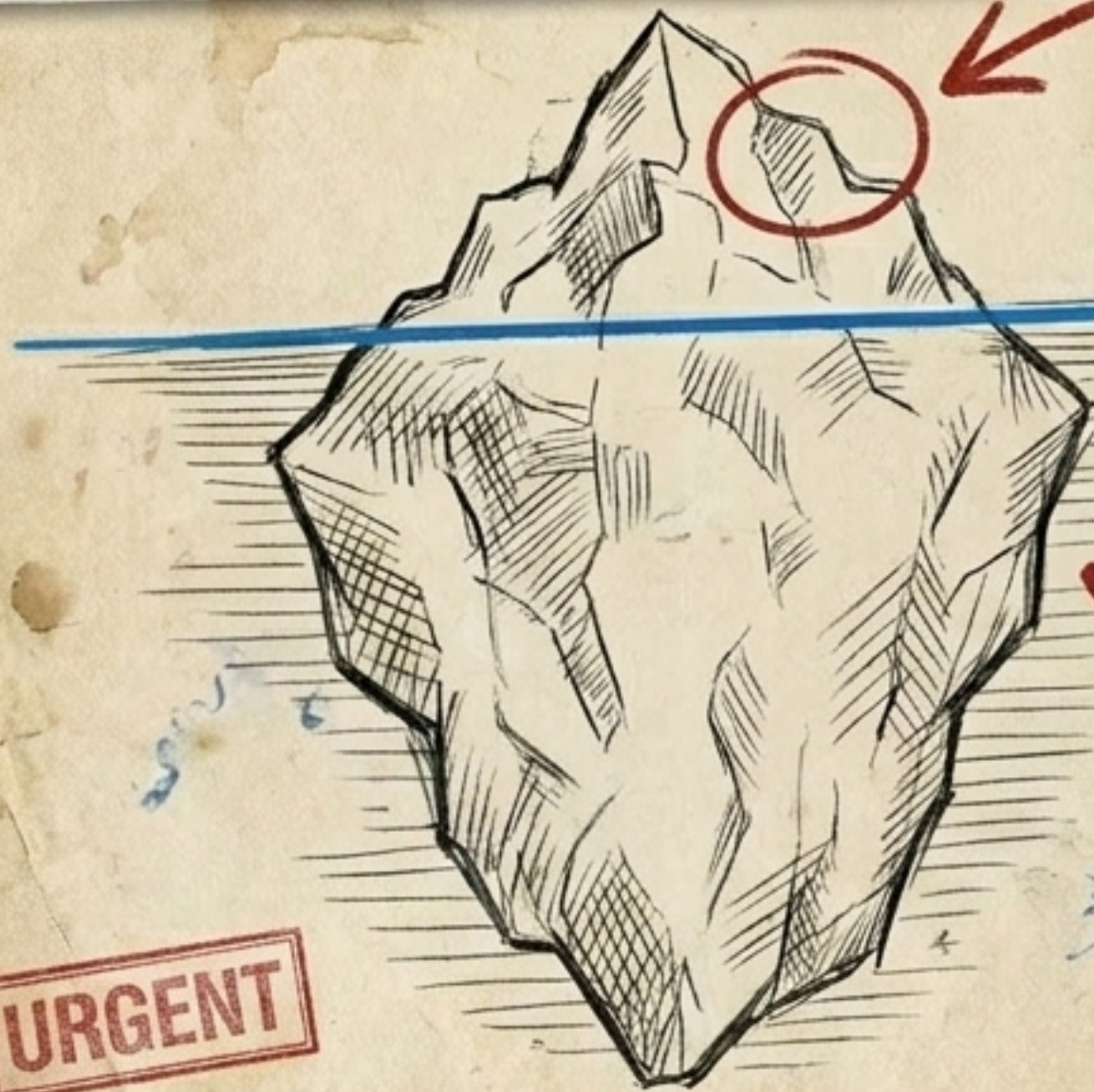

Water Level




The Real Problem (Below the Surface)

	Chapter 1 Perspective	Chapter 7 Perspective
The Socs	Cold, unfeeling enemies who jump kids for fun. Rich and untouchable.	Sick of violence. Vulnerable, grieving friends who face unique pressures from indulgent parents.
The Divide	An impassable wall between the East Side and West Side.	Broken down. A realization that heroic acts (saving kids) have nothing to do with being a Greaser or a Soc.

Ponyboy and Randy's conversation proves that empathy can bridge the harshest economic and social divides.

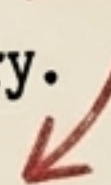
